Although the AODA is a law that we are required to meet, it is a law that is designed to provide guarantees of Accessibility for all Ontario to the facilities and programs that able bodied people have access to every day.

It has been a long time coming, and although there has been continuous progress over the past decades in matters of Accessibility, buildings and facilities continued to be built with little or no consideration for those who are disabled.

The Government of Ontario now recognizes that those living with disabilities are people too, and with a little thought and consideration, in many cases, their lives can be as productive and fulfilling as any able-bodied person.

Our Lions clubs and meeting facilities must meet those requirements as established in the AODA. After all, the Lions are an Association of inclusivity and as an example and testament to that we have one of the world's greatest Service Dog training schools (the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides) right herein Ontario.

The Government of Ontario produced a document identified as the," Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA)," 2005. It details the development, implementation, and enforcement of accessibility standards to achieve accessibility for Ontarians with disabilities in respect to goods, services, facilities, accommodation, employment, buildings, structures, and premises. The purpose is to improve accessibility for Ontarians with a medical or physical disability to all public establishments. The Act was initiated in 2005 and the Province of Ontario gave the public 20 years to bring awareness, encouragement, and inclusivity to all establishments. Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005, S.O. 2005, c. 11 (ontario.ca)



The Stouffville Lions Express Train has had varied history with our Club and other Clubs & organizations before returning to our Club. It was relocated many times over the years eventually making it back to our club through the investigative skills of Lion Joe Cote in 2017.

Lion Joe Cote has been the Lead on this Project in recent years and has done a remarkable job, with the help of other club members, in the restoration of the engine. A new crew painted and refurbished the engine and coal tender and it was ready to go in the Santa Claus parade that year. We added the lights in 2018, more lights in 2019, took a break (pandemic) in 2020, now more lights, smoke and lots of fun in 2021.



Lions and the United Nations

Lions contributed to the creation of the UN

In our continuing exploration of Lions Clubs International (LCI), we will now go over a surprising contribution following World War II, our contribution to the creation of the United Nations.



It starts in 1943 with the Allies turning the tide of World War II and despite Lions only being 26 years old, it and a few other organisations were approached to participate in a crucial initiative to reinvent a global body that would encourage peace and prosperity following hostilities. The idea of a post-war peacekeeping mechanism caught the imagination of Lions at that year's International Convention and the proposal was endorsed by the membership.

In early 1945, Lion's founder Melvin Jones along with other national leaders and senior representatives of the U.S. government joined to support the idea of forming a United Nations. The U.N. project was so exciting that by April of the same year Lions Clubs International demonstrated its full support by declaring a United Nations week to its membership.




As a result, the then leadership of Lions Clubs International was one of the first nongovernmental Nations organisations (NGO) invited to assist in the drafting of the U.N. Charter. They were particularly key in crafting the NGO section and helping to develop the U.N.'s humanitarian mission. By June 1945,

fifty nations had signed on to the U.N. charter and this grand project became a reality.

As recognition of our important role, Lions were one of the first NGOs to be given consultative status with the U.N. Economic and Social Council, a body focused on the welfare and development of people worldwide.

Today we are part of thousands of NGOs from around the world that consult and help the efforts of the United Nations. All Lions are proud and remember our early role in forming the U.N. We are glad for its role in promoting a more peaceful and equitable planet. Since 1978, Lions Day with the U.N. (LDUN) has been a celebration and advocacy event at the U.N. Headquarters that gathers world leaders to explore and discuss solutions to global needs, welcomes Lions Members to visit the Headquarters, and gives a stage for Lions to announce our International Peace Poster and Peace Essay contest winners.

Oak Ridges Lions Club Preparing for Post Pandemic



As the pandemic lingered on, our Club began to realize that while we couldn't do so many of the things we used to do, we could prepare for the world we would inherit post pandemic.

So began a Club re-vitalization plan.

We are a small club in the heart of a rapidly growing community. We didn't know it at the time, but we would be granted the benefit of over two years to put initiatives in place to breath fresh energy and plans into our Club. We knew that we desperately needed new members. We only had 10 members, and only a fraction of those were truly actively attending meetings. We realized we needed to revamp not only our meetings, but also our media presence because to attract new people, we had to ensure that the community knew we were here, still committed to and providing services to our residents.

We actively recruited some "long standing" potentially interested members, gaining 2 new younger members in that first year. This injected some much-needed new energy into the Club. We gained momentum and began recruiting more friends and neighbours. We now have an additional 3 committed new members, along with 2 more solid potential additions. This is a massive increase for our small club and has truly increased the amount of engaged energy we have at meetings!

One of these members has a terrific knowledge of technology which snowballed into a huge increase in our media presence and a complete re-branding and unification of our various website and application platforms. We added Twitter and Nextdoor in addition to our Facebook platform with Instagram to be added shortly. We scraped our old website and started a new one, one that could be more easily updated regularly and internally. These changes alone have generated long absent interest in the club.

Then we began to post items... regularly! We posted our events, we posted links to other services which mirrored our pillars and values, we posted updates and pictures about our virtual meetings, we posted anything that might get "shared" or picked up by others. It worked! We have actively had residents, businesses and government agencies reaching out to us recently. Something we hadn't seen in years!

All the while, we kept thinking about how to position our Club for that magical moment when we could get back to serving our community in person. We positioned ourselves against the five Global Causes pillars with Lead Lions on each pillar and a goal of holding at least one event (but ideally 2 events) annually for each pillar. The monthly meetings were structured to support the creative process in encouraging new or



hybrid ideas for events and initiatives, and to ensure we were on track to properly support and market these new ideas. Our first hybrid event (see "Giving Eyewear New Life") was a huge success using this new formula. We are also actively implementing succession planning and skills identification processes when we recruit new members.

We are so proud of our small group and how we have worked together to reinvent ourselves over the course of the last couple of years. We feel we are in a much better position to serve our community by taking the time, when we couldn't do as much externally as we would have hoped, to recharge our team with the structure and support it will need going forward as we move out of the pandemic.

An adventure to be celebrated!


What an experience!!! We thought we were all crazy, but we did it anyway.

There are four elementary schools in our Club's geographic area: Stuart Baker (JK to Grade 3) and J. D. Hodgson (Grades 4 to 8) in Haliburton Village; Cardiff (JK to Grade 3) in the Village of Cardiff and Wilberforce (Grade 4 to 6) in the Village of Wilberforce.

Blue Spruce Award Program for Cardiff and Stuart Baker Elementary Schools

The Blue Spruce Award is a new addition to the Haliburton Lions Reading Action Program. The Blue Spruce Award is part of the Forest of Reading Program, which is organized by the Ontario Library Association and is Canada's largest recreational reading program with participation by schools and children from kindergarten to grade 12. Ten books are chosen in each level and the Blue Spruce Award books are specifically designed for readers in kindergarten to grade 2.

Children vote to determine the winning book after they have read all of the titles. Participation in the program encourages a love of reading; promotes the development of the skill of evaluating a picture book based on the story and the pictures; and provides high quality books which remain in the schools. The Haliburton Lions have purchased two sets of the nominated books for Stuart Baker and one set for Cardiff and, in addition have paid the program registration fee for both schools.

We are excited to work with our local schools and to add this component to our existing programs.

- Books for Haliburton County's Point in Time Sensitive Santa
- Books for the YWCA HERS Shelter
- Our two Little Free Libraries

In September we will be partnering with the Haliburton Arts Council with the first ever Bookapalooza - a showcase event featuring local writers and arts/writing-related organizations and businesses in Haliburton and Muskoka.
