The Email's subject should include:

"Club Name" <u>or</u> "Committee Name" and "DG Newsletter" and/or "Lions Magazine" submission. Club submission

SUCCESSION PLANNING

Vision Screening

Free Children's Vision Program Expands

Today the Greenbank Community Association Inc. has received \$ 3500 from the Canada Post Community Foundation for a vision screening program that will benefit young children in Durham and York Region and beyond starting in September 2018. This plus another \$4000 from the District A-16 Vision Screening Account will complete the purchase of a vision kit.

The project will be carried out by Lion/Lioness volunteers in over 60 clubs. These volunteers provide free vision screening for senior kindergarten children in hundreds of schools. The vision program identifies potential vision issues that will affect the ability of a child to learn to their full potential. This grant will provide funding for a new Plusoptix vision scanner and allow the current program to expand to additional schools. It is all part of a Canada Post/Lion/Lioness Program that helps make a difference in the lives of Canadian children.

I am suggesting we try to arrange this during A-16 Service Week Oct 22 thru Oct 28 – specifically Wed. Oct 24 2018. It gives us time to contact the schools and do the organization needed.

I have a letter to give to the school administration, a letter to send home to the parents and last year's (2017) Educational Resource Info. Just let me know and I will forward them to you.

As this is my first year, I do not know all the mechanics of the event – but these are my thoughts.

A) Meet with the school Principal or person in charge of events. Determine the number of students and the number of home rooms. This will give you numbers for the letter to the parents and for collection boxes. Also, this will determine the actual date of the "Sleep Day" depending on the school calendar.

B) On Sleep Day, be at the school to hand out contribution boxes to each Home room. Ask each teacher to bring the full box to the office as soon as time permits.

C) Either at the school or at another location, count and roll the donations. Have your treasurer deposit this money and write a cheque to Gail Neiman, Cabinet Treasurer with the name of the school and SCAW in the memo. Mail the cheque to Gail at 2 Manor Dr, Apt 217, Millbrook, ON LOA 1G0 Seems pretty easy – I hope.


Service Recognition


