



Dare to Dream

Dare to Dream means to dream even when people doubt you, you still follow your heart. I think like the quote "The greatest pleasure in life is doing what people say you cannot do," (Walter Bagehot). That means it is fun to try what people say you cannot do. For instance, in basketball they use auditory cues (tapping the net so the player knows where to aim), balls with bells inside, and a narrator announcing where players are. People sometimes underestimate what people with a visual impairment can do. I think everyone should dream big, even those with a disability. Everyone can accomplish their dreams with access and the right tools. Such as Perkins brailler, brailliant and jaws screen reader computer. Access means everyone can do

it with things like braille labels. It feels discouraging to have people underestimate you. Most people with a visual impairment have experienced this. I think everyone should be treated equally and have the same opportunities. Their boss should provide full access to the employee. Without it makes them feel like they are not as good at their job but really you just need to make it accessible. There should be braille labels around the office, elevators to travel between floors. My advice is to keep dreaming big and believe in yourself because believing in yourself is a big step to dreaming big, and you must take risks to dream big. A way you can do this is accepting yourself, if you are persistent and have a growth mindset. Having a growth mindset means saying I cannot do it now but later I will if I practice. Your limit is your This means you can dream as much as your imagination allows you. *imagination*. For instance, the hockey player Paul Rosen started playing competitive hockey at a young age. Because of an injury and illness, he got his leg amputated. He did not let that stop his dream of hockey. He found another way to play by joining the paralympic sport sledge hockey team. He was a three time gold medal paralympian. Mr. Rosen is a good example of a person who dared to dream. My dream is to entertain and make people happy. One of the ways I can do this is by working at Nintendo and working on my YouTube channel. I might face challenges as an adult. A challenge I could face would be getting hired because I have a visual impairment. I would write a resume and say even though I have a visual impairment I am still as capable at animation. I might do something slightly different but I would still get the animation in my own way, just as well as anyone else. Dare to Dream means to dream even when people doubt you, you still follow your heart. So, I will look for role models and work hard and follow my dreams. This is my hope for everyone.

From the A-16 Global Membership Team:



As a member of your club, you are an integral part of what Lions do, whether you hold an official title or not.

Every Lion in our organization, makes a difference in this world we live in. We are, together, a positive influence making great strides in helping others around the world. Every time a member joins our service organization, new ideas, new faces and new energy can start flowing as we strengthen in numbers of those who care.

Please do share your ideas and dreams with your club of how you and others in your club can make a bigger impact in helping others. A great way to do this, is to speak first with your sponsor, mentor or maybe a committee chair or someone that you feel close to in the club. They can help you prepare to share your vision, so that others will want to help you, serve with you and fill the need.



Another way, we can all make a BIGGER difference, is

to share why we are Lions, and ask others to come out to a service event, help others and ask them to become Lions.

Time does seem to be more limited in this fast-paced world these days. That's largely why we need MORE Lions. Remember that if everyone in your club was to sponsor a new Lion in the next 2 years, how many more needs in the community could be met, even if not all of your members could help out at every service event.

Many people today are not able to commit to more than 1 or 2 meetings a month along with 3 to 4 hours on one weekend a month. Be upfront and honest with those you ask. Ask them if they would find it worthwhile to make an impact of the lives of others by volunteering for no more than 10 hours a month. That's 10 hours out of 390 of our average waking hours a month. When you are asking a working individual with kids at home, they probably only have 40 hours a month of spare time, so asking for 10 hours may be a struggle sometimes.

Year 2024 - Time for a Reality Checkup?

If we want younger, family members to join, we may need to consider some changes. Plan family friendly service projects and meetings, perhaps. If members can't make in-person meetings, can we arrange an online meet-up or an email vote and discussion? Ask your members and make effective changes in 2024.

Please remember to ask yourselves whether the services you are doing for the community are engaging for your members. Are they fun? Provide rewarding feedback? Limited time

commitments for everyone involved? Are they fulfilling a need in the community? If your club did not do this event, would it be missed? Can you give this service a new twist to change things up?

Not sure..... maybe it's an ideal time to ask your mayor, principal of one of your schools and/or Community Police officer for their input on what is truly needed in the community and see how your club aligns with the needs suggested. (Community Needs Assessment)



Do you have youth involvement in your service activities? Does your local high school solicit for community service hours for their students? Are your local youth getting into more trouble than good? Do they lack Leadership, Experience and Opportunity? Not sure you are ready to meet those needs? Why not think about a public meeting to discuss an interest in forming a Leos club? Invite parents, students, local church ministers and other business leaders to it. Read all about Leos clubs, youth exchange programs and more at <u>www.lionsclubs.org</u> could just be the best service yet for your community.












Charter Anniversary



Coboconk and District Lions Celebrate 70 Years of Service

Attendees included the A16 Governor Sudha Verma, five PDG's, two Zone Chairs and a representative from all three levels of Government, as well as many Lions from neighboring Lions clubs.



A decision was made early on not to hold the celebration at our Lions Hall but at the local RC Legion. A small committee was set up to handle the organizational part of the celebration. We contracted out the setup and cooking so our members could enjoy the events.

We had a meet and greet from noon until 12:30, followed by greetings from several dignitaries. Then our longest serving member and former Melvin Jones award winning Lion Bill

Finally in June of 2023 BonBon and Michelle were paired up. One fantastic part of this story is Michelle is the granddaughter of two of our Lions. This project was just meant to be.

A conversation with Lion Khrisstina Engel, our Accessibility Chairperson and Club President of a new Cyber Club Branch



The District Governor's Newsletter editor invited Lion Khrisstina Engel of North Newmarket Lions Club to share her journey as a Lion with our readers.

Thank you Lion Khrisstina for participating in the interview.

Editor: Can you tell us when did you become a Lion? And how did you begin your journey as a Lion?

Lion Khrisstina: A close family friend who was a member brought me to my first North Newmarket Lions Club meeting in May 2015 hoping that one day to be sponsored for a guide dog. She thought the club members could meet me and they could tell me more about the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. I was only 7 months into my Vision Loss journey, so I was nowhere near to being able to apply for a guide dog. I had only been using a white cane for a month. The one consent memory of that first meeting was how welcomed I felt. No one treated me any differently. They saw me as the person first and the vision loss second. Members came over to where I was and took



turns introducing themselves to me. During the meeting, they would explain certain things about Lions that as a new person I had no idea what they were talking about. There was another member in the club who lived with sight loss, and she was the President. I thought to myself Wow, this is amazing. I went home with a smile. My friend invited me to the next meeting which I was happy to be able to attend. That night I filled out my membership application with assistance. I was initiated as a member of the North Newmarket Lions Club in December 2015.

Editor: You are a very special individual as you do not let your vision impairment slow you down in serving as a Lion. Can you share with us some of your memorable moments as a Lion?

Lion Khrisstina: My motto has been since my vision loss journey began, I can do what you can do I just do it slower and differently but at the end of the day it comes out the same. I have so many memorable moments as a Lion that I would never have dreamt of before my Vision Loss

journey. The North Newmarket Lions Club has some wonderful leaders who see each person for their abilities, and the possibility of a great leader. If you live with challenges, that doesn't matter. This Lions Club really believes in mentoring. They will work with you to help you achieve a goal. Becoming the North Newmarket Lions Club, Club Secretary for 4 years was not something I thought I could do but one day I had 3 Lions knocking on my door who asked me to become the Club Secretary. They believed in me when I did not. These 2 great mentors spent the time to help me learn the Lions portal and how to do service reports. The one thing I should point out is that I was just learning to use a screen reader on my computer, so this was a learning curve for me but a good one as I now needed to be more efficient on my computer with the screen reader.

In 2017/2018 being asked my PDG JC LaGrange to start the first District A-16 Accessibility Committee. In 2020/2021 Council Chair Elect Debbie Dawson asked me to start the Accessibility Committee on Multiple District 'A' which has been a huge learning experience. I am so proud of the work we have been doing on Accessibility in District A-16 and Multiple District "A". In December 2021, I was asked to speak at the Lions of Canada Canadian Conversation on the work we have been doing in Accessibility which was such an honour. This year I was asked to be apart of the Multiple District "A" Sight Conservation/CNIB Lake Joesph Committee which has been an incredible honour for me as this camp means so much to me as a client/camper/and Lion.

I have to say the work I have done to promote the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides is where I am the proudest. I have been honoured to have been invited to various Lions Clubs in District A-16 to speak about my experience as a Guide Dog handler and going through the training at the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. I have been a Guest speaker for several Pet Valu Walks for Dog Guides. The North Newmarket Lions Club is what makes me the happiest as they sponsored me to get a Guide Dog for which I am forever grateful. We organize the Pet Valu Walk for Dog Guides Newmarket for several years including virtually during Covid-19. We have been selling the

Green Capes Calendars for several years. In 2019, at New'Barket' which is a dog festival in Newmarket every September we had a booth for the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides where I was able to call on my friends who are graduates from various programs and foster puppies/parents to attend during which we were able to educate the community on Dog Guides awareness and etiquette. The North Newmarket Lions Club holds a Curling Bonspiel for Puppies annually and we can get Graduates from various programs and foster puppies/parents to come out and educate the curlers. *Editor:* You have a service dog, Nutmeg, with you. How long have you two been together? And where did you receive your service dog?

Lion Khrisstina: Nutmeg is my Guide Dog, and she is from the Lions Foundation of Canada



Dog Guides which the North Newmarket Lions Club sponsored us for which I am forever grateful. Nutmeg and I graduated on March 9, 2017. Nutmeg and I will be celebrating 7 years this March 2024. We are the only team left in my class that are still working. Nutmeg is such an incredible Guide Dog, and she truly loves to work. Nothing makes her happier than getting her harness on and heading out the door. I truly was blessed when Nutmeg came into my life. We bonded instantly from the moment we met and walked down the hall at the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides on my first full day of training. I didn't even know she was going to be my dog. We were told not to fall in love with the dog we were walking with as most likely they weren't our dogs but getting told she was going to go home with me was the most incredible feeling. It took me a few days to realize this new reality, but I am thankful Nutmeg was given to me. She is so special. I love her so much and she has given me more than I could ever give her.

Editor: You just started a new cyber branch club with members coming across a large geography. What can you tell us about the new club? And how did you come up with the idea of the new club?

Lion Khrisstina: I came up with the idea of starting a new Lions Club in 2018, after returning home from 12 days at CNIB Lake Joesph which is a camp for the blind in Muskoka. The problem was how to get us together when transportation is an issue. I thought perhaps through Facebook but not everyone who lives with Sight loss can use Facebook or use a computer. In 2019, CNIB started to teach clients how to use Zoom and started support groups across Canada in which I participated. I knew this was my answer. Covid-19 hit and my dream of starting a Lions Club for those who live with Sight Loss was put to the side. When PDG Carolyn Stephenson was District Governor I attended her Zoom District Committee Chairperson's Goals for the year. One goal was to start a Cyber Club, Speciality Club, and a Branch Club. PDG Carolyn and I quickly started to discuss this idea of a cyber specialty branch club. GMT Karen Thompson and I started to work on learning more about Branch Clubs as we didn't have one in A-16. When I left for Camp in August 2022, I had a plan in which I was able to talk to many of the campers who were and were not Lions. We now had some more people interested in

becoming a Lions member. At the end of February 2023, GMT Karen Thompson and I held the History meeting to follow 2 weeks later in March with the Information meeting. On August 30, 2023, Lions International accepted our Branch application and Canada True Vision Cyber Club Branch was now apart of District A-16 with thanks to the support of the North Newmarket Lions Club who is the parent club and sponsored our branch club.

Editor: I understand that your new branch club members come from all over Ontario and beyond. Can you tell us more about that?

Lion Khrisstina: Canada True Vision Cyber Club Branch represents members of the Lions family across Canada who are visually impaired or blind, but we do have sighted members as well. Members of Canada True Vision Cyber Club Branch are in 3 provinces which we like to say coast to coast across Canada. This is very exciting as we are the only Club that represents all of Canada with members in other provinces.

Editor: Looking forward, what do you want your new club to be like?

Lion Khrisstina: I would like to continue showing the Lions family how limitations and barriers can be overcome. True vision has little to do with sight rather it is more the way we perceive the world around us. With saying that Canada True Vision Lions has been accepting Lions who live with challenges who may not be able to attend in person meetings for various reasons relating to their non-visible challenges. Being on Zoom is giving them the opportunity to be active and doing service. I started this Lions Club for the visually impaired, but I see a bigger picture. There is a need for Cyber Clubs that are accepting of anyone who lives with challenges. We, the Canada True Vision Cyber Club Branch, will welcome everyone.

Our main goals will not change going forward. It will always be to educate and communicate to the Lions family on issues relating to vision loss. We will share our experiences and advice in living in today's world. We will continue to celebrate each member's successes as a Lions Club family.

Markham Lions Club Celebrating Lion C. Donald Brodie



Beaverton Lions Club The Reading Action Project 2023



The Beaverton Lions provide ongoing programs, activities and services to the residents of the Lakeview Manor Long Term Care. Lakeview is owned by the Regional Municipality of Durham. It is home to 149 people.

During COVID the residents were restricted to their immediate residence areas. They were unable to access the common areas in the facility, including the library. Many residents missed being able to have books, audiobooks and DVDs available to them. The library was converted into a staff and caregiver COVID test center. In 2022, the Beaverton Lions purchased and installed bookcases for each of the units. It was noted at the time that many of the books in the testing/library area were in poor condition or were unsuitable for use by the residents.

This need inspired.

The Great Library Collection Makeover 2023 edition.

In January, a group of Lions met at Lakeview Manor for a few hours every week to sort, label, and reorganize the entire collection in the still "closed" library. Books that were beyond their useful lifespan were recycled. We soon realized we needed more books to fill up the shelves on the units and to refill the library. After requesting donations at a Lions



meeting, cartons and cartons of gently used and new books began arriving.

As our project progressed, the staff at Lakeview mentioned that it was a dream of theirs to have the fiction collection become Large Print only so the books could be enjoyed by more residents.

One of our Lion's members works at the local public library and was able to arrange for large print books that had been removed from their collection to be donated to the makeover. Another nearby library system was hosting a book sale, so a member purchased and donated over 100 gently used large print.



All the books had genre labels affixed to their spines so the books could be easily identified. The labels help keep the main library looking organized and tidy. Labelling books, we soon learned, takes a very long time. Lions put in over 30 service hours just on the labelling task.





Once all the books were ready for reading, several Lions delivered a selection of books, audiobooks and DVDs to each of the bookcases in the unit common areas. It was at that time we realized that we had no bookends (and no budget to purchase safe new bookends). Another group of Lions got together and made beautiful custom bookends from wood and labeled with our Lions Club logo.

As we were able to switch the Lakeview collection to large print, we realized we had a collection of labeled regular print books to find new space for. We contacted Durham Region

Community Housing who arranged for us to meet with the building manager at the Wayside Apartments. They welcomed our help. We were able to replace their entire collection and the residents and manager were thrilled. We will visit a couple of times a year to switch out their materials.



Our project reached nearly 200 people who could not access reading materials. We put in over 150 hours of service and had a lot of fun whilst doing so.
