


District A-16 Governor's Newsletter

Our international guest speaker is Past International Director, **Jeffery R. Gans** of Collingswood, New Jersey, USA. This convention is gearing up to be amazing, fun, and entertaining. The Planning Team has been busy arranging various dynamic speakers and entertainers and so I would encourage you if you have not yet registered to attend that you do so at your earliest convenience.

This convention will also give you an opportunity to elect your 2023-2024 district officers. Clubs are eligible to vote (delegates) if members and clubs are in good standing and all outstanding dues have been paid. Similarly, clubs are looking to elect their club officers for the

new lions' year. Please continue to encourage members to step up into leadership roles. Look around for candidates with identifiable skills and use the tips shared with you at the Succession Planning workshop and at the last round of Leadership Joint Zone Meetings, to fill these roles as there is some hesitancy on the part of members due to time, work/family balance and energy to commit but necessary for the health and vitality of the organization. There are still vacancies existing in the district and in the regions that need to be filled. We need your help in filling these roles.

I know you have heard me mention on many occasions, the need to empower our LCIF to do what they do best on our behalf by donating, especially as the need is so great right now. Just look at what is happening in Ukraine, Syria, and Turkey. It is also worth considering that to qualify for the *Club Excellence Award* you must have donated to LCIF. It was my honour to accompany Keaton and his mother Sonia to New York City and to share this once in a lifetime experience with them.



An Interview with RC Martin Jones

Member of Oshawa Airport Lions Club

Lion Martin Jones is serving as Region Chairperson of Region 33. We talked to him about his journey as Lion and his experiences with other Lions Clubs and Districts as he has moved across the country.



Editor: *You have been a very dedicated and extremely busy Lion as you have travelled across our country following your career. Knowing that Lions Clubs follow the 'Your Club, Your Way' approach, you have experienced many different approaches to service as you participated in the Dundas Lions Club, Ft. McMurray Lions Club, Lacombe Lions Club, Whitby Lions Club, and Oshawa Airport Lions Club. Having experienced how each Club has functioned in its own way, how has this prepared you for further leadership roles in District A-16?*

Lion Martin: I have experienced clubs of different sizes and different focuses for service projects. Being President of a club with minimal membership like Fort McMurray has taught me how important membership size is to be able to accomplish any service goal, and the stress to fill all the leadership roles. The opposite is true of a large club as you have to negotiate with the membership to determine and prioritize which service goals to undertake. I have found there is usually enough interest in large clubs to fill all leadership roles. My journey toward running for 2VDG this has prepared me, by improving my negotiating skills in the large clubs and learning to juggle many tasks in small clubs by wearing many hats.



Editor: *As an Associate Dean at Durham College, Whitby Campus, you may have recognized areas where our Lions could provide support and encouragement for the students. Can you comment on this?*

Lion Martin: I am currently working with Durham College and IPDG Barry to see if there is an interest in starting an alumni Lions Club at the college, since there are over 100,000 alumni. This way we can support the college, student bursaries and scholarships and most importantly, the student food bank. The Durham College food bank would welcome any food donations from any Lions Clubs in the District.

Editor: At our recent Joint Zone Meetings across our District, our Lions were introduced to LCI's S.W.O.T. Analysis, and had an opportunity to share their thoughts with Lions from other Clubs. How might our Clubs be encouraged to see the value in this Analysis and adopt it?

Lion Martin: While working at Dofasco, SWOT was a very important part of our yearly department planning process. In my experience when SWOT is completed correctly it is an excellent planning tool to move the department forward, therefore I see no reason why SWOT would not be successful in any Lions club and I would be willing to bring my years of experience to help any club through the SWOT process.

Editor: For the last few years we have seen more Clubs reporting their service on MyLion. How would you suggest encouraging all Clubs to report monthly?

Lion Martin: Using MYLION is very easy! As well as being easy it is also very important to identify and record all events, whether it be service, meetings or fundraising. I would encourage clubs to have a recording secretary whose job it is to enter on MyLion each month, taking some of the work off the club secretary. Any club member can enter event information on MyLion.

Editor: Until the onset of Covid, our District encouraged our members to make Club visits; in fact, there was a Visitation Trophy presented each year at the annual District A16 Convention. Do you view this as valuable, and, if so, how might this be encouraged once again?

Lion Martin: I do see this Trophy as a very valuable asset for encouraging clubs to do visits. Over my time in Lions, I have visited many clubs and since becoming Zone Chair and Region Chair I have appreciated my chance to visit other clubs in district A16 and I am always learning something new. Visitations are an excellent opportunity to share ideas and possibly work together on common service or fundraising projects. Combing efforts allows clubs to build connections with other Lions outside of their own club and who knows what that may lead to.







Along the way, the Newmarket Lions supported the Huron Heights Student Peace Club Holiday Dinner for 800+ Newmarket citizens.



This month plans are underway to extend our Santa Fund Food Voucher Program for 100 of the neediest and largest families with food vouchers in our Spring Giving Program. From those beginnings in 1931 with food hampers, the need for food and the need to support those in need has not changed but the activities to make it happen have. Our weekly fundraising efforts have made much of this possible, along with our many Club and Friends of Lions volunteers.


